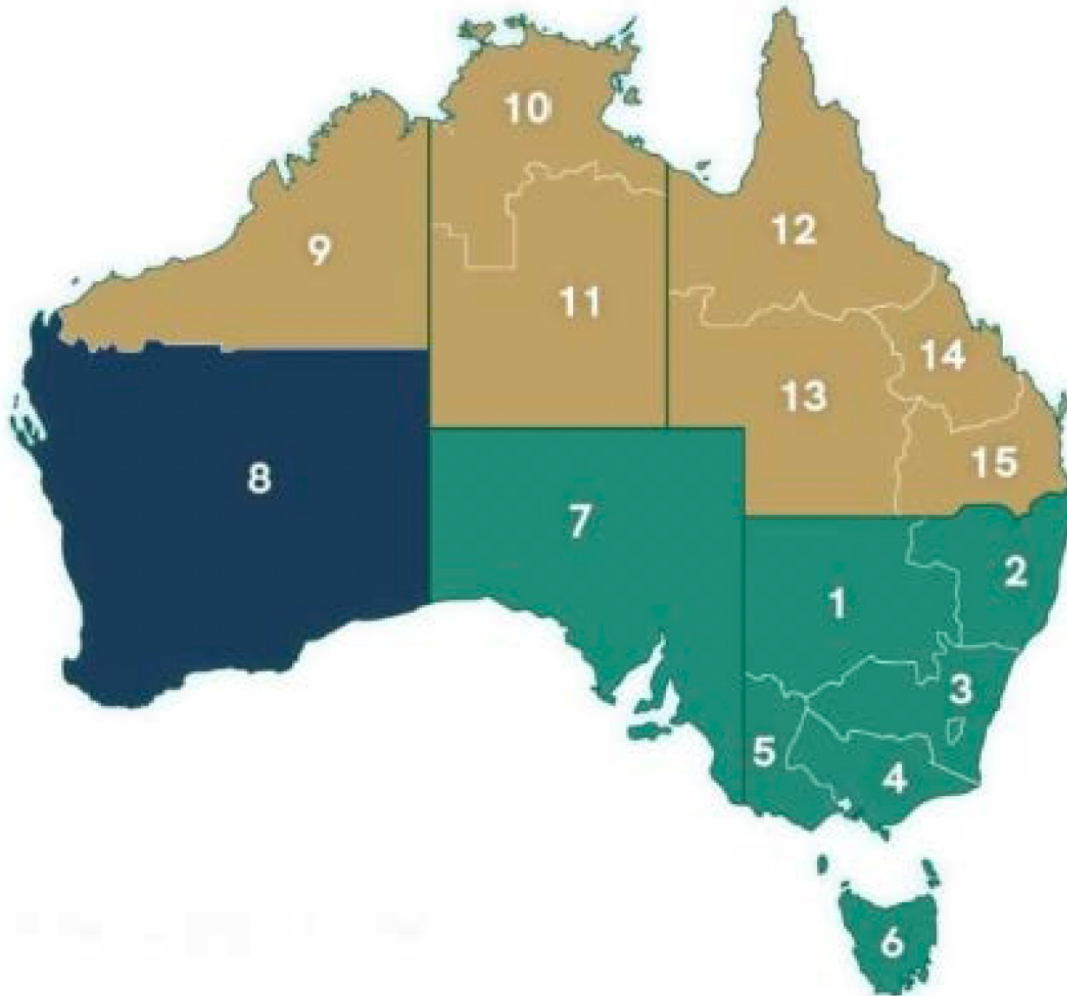


About the Regional Consultative Committee

The Cattle Australia Regional Consultative Committee (**RCC**) represents grassfed cattle producers across Australia in the development of CA strategies for industry representation and community engagement.

The CA RCC consists of elected CA members from 15 regions across Australia, and delegates of state farming organisations (**SFO**).



RCC key role in industry consultation

The RCC consults directly with levy-payers and provides advice to CA on issues and priorities for the grassfed cattle sector in relation to industry representation, policy, stakeholder consultation, and engagement with Meat and Livestock Australia, Animal Health Australia and National Residue Survey.

The RCC reports to the CA Board on issues it has identified that may impact industry profitability, productivity and sustainability.

RCC representatives are required to undertake a number of grassroots engagement and consultation activities with levy payers in their region, to ensure their region is effectively represented in discussions held at a national level.

As a representative on the RCC, elected individuals and SFO delegates contribute to a powerful, national voice representing Australian cattle producers when important government and industry decisions are being discussed.

Eligibility Requirements

To be eligible to stand for election as representative of your region¹, a nominee must:

1. Be an Individual Member² or Associate Member³ of CA (or a representative thereof).
2. Complete the attached form.
3. Be nominated by two CA Individual Members of that region (using the same form), for approval by the CA Board. Note: The photograph and information provided in the application will be used by CA for the nomination and voting process and published to CA members in the specified region. The name of proposers will also be published.
4. Have grassfed cattle sector experience, and be keen to play an active role in the community.
5. If there is more than one nominee in any region, an election will be held in that region.

RCC member expectations

As a member of CA, nominees will already be bound by its [Constitution](#) and [By-laws](#), but specifically all RCC representatives must agree to be bound by the RCC terms of reference.⁴

RCC representatives are volunteers and do not receive sitting fees. The RCC meets in person three times per year, around March, August and November. CA makes the necessary arrangements. Travel related costs are funded by CA.

With the assistance of CA management, elected RCC representatives are required to arrange at least one dedicated levy payer consultation and engagement event in their region each year. CA provides support with resources and funding as required.

RCC Terms

Elected RCC representatives sit for a term of two years, expiring on the second anniversary of the AGM at which their appointment was announced.

Monday, 29 June 2026	Announcement of result if one nominee accepted by the CA Board
Thursday, 2 July 2026 9am AEST	If more than one nominee accepted by the CA Board, voting period opens for 15 business days
Wednesday 22 July 2026 5pm AEST	Voting period closes
Thursday, 23 July 2026	Announcement of result if voting process required
